WELCOME at a Glance

WELCOME will deliver a mobile device-based platform, which will facilitate the interaction of Third Country Nationals (TCNs) with virtual agents, and a desktop-based solution for the support of authorities.

WELCOME will validate the developed platform as a whole as well as each of its technologies through three different use cases in Germany, Greece, and Spain:

- ☐ TCN reception and orientation
- TCN integration
- Support of TCN's living in the host country

Target users

Users: Civil Society Organisations, Authorities and other service providers

Final beneficiaries: TCNs in

Germany (City of Hamm)

Greece (Athens/Thessaloniki)

Spain (Region of Catalonia)

Objective

An empirical study of the social and psychological backgrounds of TCNs and outline how these backgrounds can be taken into account during their reception and integration in the European Union by intelligent personalized assistance technologies.

Research Questions

- 1. What are the social, cultural, educational and economic backgrounds of the TCNs?
- 2. What are the specific needs, strengths and vulnerabilities of TCNs in the above three target countries?
- 3. What are common symptoms of trauma and levels of stress?
- 4. Do TCNs trust technology and its developers?
- 5. Are there differences between target groups?
- 6. What are common integration challenges faced by the target groups in the three host countries?

Methodology

Phase 1

- Desk research
- Semi-structured survey filled by user partners

Phase 2

Semi-structured interviews:

- TCNs
- refugee- / migrant service providers

Instruments

Numeric data

gender, nationality, languages, age, family composition, educational background, legal status, employment, housing, social economic status, religious identity.

Qualitative data

bonds with home country, motivation to reside and integrate, common needs and challenges, access to services, effects of the pandemic.

<u>Psychological distress (quantitative data)</u> Hopkins Symptoms Check List 25 (HSCL-25) Self-Reporting Questionnaire 20 (SRQ-20)



Learnings (first results)

- →negative effect on psychosocial adjustment
 - Unsecure status
 - Unemployed/underemployed
 - Isolation
 - Feeling of "not having succeeded in integration"
- →better psychological adjustment
 - Having children and hopes for them
 - Having plans for the future

Challenges, limitations

Data collection

- Reluctancy to share information in mixed gender interview setting
- Language differences, cultural bias

Technical limitations

- How to translate findings into programme design?
- Limited capacity for emotional intelligence of Al
- Avoiding the trigger instead of caring for trauma
